

BIBLE STUDY CORNER

"I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will

be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven."

Matthew 16:19

Reflection: We have keys to our home, car, office, storage room, safe-deposit box, locker, and other important areas. We know the keys can't open and close on their own; the person with the keys is the controlling agent. We're responsible for the keys and must use them with awareness. We don't want the keys to be lost or to fall into the wrong hands, lest all our possessions and valuables be taken. We discern whether a person is trustworthy before handing over our keys.

We have other keys—freedom, knowledge, wisdom, love, compassion, forgiveness, and peace. We know these keys have no power to do anything on their own.

We must discern how, when, and where to use these keys. We can use these keys to open our minds and hearts to the beauty of creation, life, and humanity. We can use these keys to liberate people from oppression, illiteracy, ignorance, hatred, suffering, conflict, and violence. We must be careful not to lose these keys or have them taken away against our will.

People of faith understand that we've been entrusted with the keys to the kingdom of heaven. We've been given access to god's love, compassion, forgiveness, and peace. Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the wisdom of the community, we carry out God's mission by spreading the Good News of the kingdom to people everywhere.

Ponder: Do I take responsibility for my actions?

Prayer: Lord, you entrusted the keys of the kingdom of heaven to your people. Help me be your wise and responsible servant.

Practice: Today I will be faithful by visiting being more aware of my personal responsibilities.

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

To stand in the presence of God is to stand in the presence of incomprehensible mystery. We are people of proofs and facts. With good reason, we are becoming more doubtful of what presents itself to us, as technology makes it easy to fabricate false images and distort what is actually true. What we think is real actually may not be. We become skeptical. Does this skepticism affect our relationship with God? To have faith in God means that we must be willing to trust in the absence of full knowledge. To know the mind of God means we would know God himself, and that is impossible. To acknowledge Jesus as the Christ means we acknowledge that the reality and presence of an incarnate God has a fundamental claim on who we are. When we name this truth, we participate in a depth of knowledge that stretches us far beyond the scope of our minds. It brings us to silence, which is the only way to touch our soul.
